# **Pied Pumkin**

St.. James Hall (3214 West 10th Avenue) Tickets \$20 (\$17 members)

ver the past 22 years of presenting "The Edge On Folk" I have come across quite a few bands that have a style that seems to be unique to Vancouver and the West Coast. There are strong traditional roots in the music, the instrumentation is mostly acoustic, the vocals feature exemplary harmonies, and there is a definite wackiness running through the songs and tunes. Prime examples would be Spirit of the West, Nyetz, The Paperboys, Mad Pudding, Zubot & Dawson, and The Bills. There have been plenty more such bands, of course, these are just a few of my own personal favourites.

The band that defined this style was active long before I reached these shores in 1981 - Pied Pumkin. B.C.'s most lovable string band of the 1970s began their trail-blazing antics back in 1973, and soon became the darlings of the college circuit and the burgeoning folk festival scene. Their stage shows were renowned for off-the-cuff craziness, gorgeous harmonies, and intricate, swinging, rhythmic tunes that filled the dance floor with happy gyrating bodies. At the same time, Pied Pumkin blazed the trail for independent record production and sales - selling over 30,000 LPs from the stage between 1973 and 1976 when Shari Ulrich left to join Valdy's Hometown Band. But I'm getting ahead of myself here.

Pied Pumkin: the lotus eaters blues band, the lost soul singers of the rain forest, mushroom madrigal mayhem with strings. Their amalgamation was a little improbable, perhaps, but as American novelist Anne Nietzche says, "North America is tilted to the west, and all the loose

stuff ends up on the coast!" Rick Scott, the tall handsome Texan, former Military Policeman, he of the gurning - that's face contortions, by the way - and "electric snowshoe" fame - that's a supercharged mountain dulcimer, teamed up with California blonde multi-instrumentalist Shari Ulrich and Vancouver's mercurial guitarist Joe Mock right here in Lotusland. They inspired a generation to make another generation of folkies, who are now procreating another. And so on, and so on. All this from a tiny pumpkin seed sown in 1973. Somewhere along the way the spelling changed, but the energy never wavered. Not even when Shari left and Rick and Joe went on as Pied Pear and then Joe drifted across the Pacific Ocean to live in Tokyo while Shari left Valdy behind and started a successful solo career, and Rick became one of Canada's

most popular children's entertainers and learned tightrope walking - and elephant riding in Thailand!

The magic was clearly still there when the Pumkin reunited 10 years after the demise of the Pear in 1988 with a new tape of unre-

> leased material - the marvellous "Lost Squash Tapes" and wowed audiences across the West with a stunning tour of concert halls and folk festivals. They had so much fun they decided to repeat the process whenever possible. A retrospective CD was released in 1998 - "Plucking DeVine", followed by a live CD of old and new songs - "Pied Alive" in 2000. Now they have a brand new collection of "tuneful tales for kids & kin" -"Pumkids" - to mark the 30th anniversary of the Vancouver

Childrens Festival.

Rick plays all those dulcimers and sings and tells stories and pulls faces and chortles away in his fetchingly rough-hewn voice, perfectly complemented by the soaring angelic vocals, fiddle, mandolin, flute, piano and dulcimer of Miz Shari. And Joe Mock adds his trademark rambling guitar solos, strident piano, and touching songs to the mix. The three voices combine to sublime harmonic effect, and the dance floor fills up with three generations of whirling revellers. Don't miss the return of the Great Pumkin at the St. James Hall, and hear the West Coast Sound - Canadian style, as performed by its founders. It's the perfect way to celebrate the Rogue's 20th Birthday!

# Stacey Earle & Mark Stuart

Stacey Earle's first show was on an arena stage in Sydney, playing rhythm guitar in her brother's band, Steve Earle & the Dukes, on "The Hard Way" tour in 1990. Playing before thousands of fans in a foreign country was not terrifying, she said. "It was magical. I knew right there and then I'm supposed to be doing this." She spent about a year and a half on tour with her brother, and then returned to Nashville to start a career of her own as a country/folk singer/songwriter. It was there she found she had a lot more to learn. "I was 30 years old and seeking a recording deal in Nashville at that age was like asking god to turn back the world clock." She would later land a Staff writing position with a publishing company. Then she met her future husband Mark Stuart. "I learned almost all the best of my musicianship from Mark exploring a wide range of influences, from blues to folk to rockabilly to country. Between the two of us we had a lot to show and tell. We still learn from each other day in and out." OrlandoCitybeat.com describes Stacey's voice as "...an unusual marriage of childlike purity and womanfrom-the-hills mysticism."

Having grown up in a musical family, Mark has been playing professionally

for years. The two have diverse styles of singing, writing, and playing, but they complement one another brilliantly. Stuart's guitar sets the performance in motion, while Stacey's voice seems to take it to new levels. Mark also spent some time in the Dukes in the 1990s. He recalls it as a time of glamour: appearing on The Tonight Show with Jay Leno, doing gigs with Neil Young. "I had someone tuning my guitar, strapping on my guitar," he said. "Now we carry our stuff 3 flights up in the Red Roof Inn."

Stacey and Mark found themselves inseparable from the beginning. Their Songs are the diaries of their life - good times and bad. They have released three duo albums, the latest being S&M Communion Bread. Their setup is a simple one - two voices, two guitars, and brilliant songs of love, passion, despair, loneliness, and joy. Their performances are gentle and affecting, but the music is complex, reflecting the experience of two battle-scarred veterans of the road.

We caught up with them in Memphis at the Folk Alliance conference in February, where they gave over their hotel room to showcase some of their favourite musical duos. They performed a few sets themselves, too, and played some old favourites, hammed it up a bit, and generally had a fine old time. They also demonstrated that they have a wealth of new material ready for a new CD in the next few months.



# This month at the Rogue

For some reason, Kaustinen, a cluster of villages in the Ostrobothnia region of western Finland has long been known for producing an inordinate number of



The band's name comes from the Norse goddess of Marriage and Fertility, and the music they make really is a union of two Scandinavian folk traditions, which - with touches of American styles



excellent fiddle players. In recent years, this mysterious fiddling force has been augmented by the fact that local fiddle hero Mauno Järvelä decided to teach fiddle to all the kids in the area who wanted to learn. Now the region is a hotbed of playing, tune-writing, performing and arranging. The seven-piece, Finnish-Norwegian band Frigg includes three musicians from this area, all relatives of the aforementioned fiddle teacher: daughter Alina (fiddle), son Esko (fiddle and harmonium) and nephew Antti (fiddle and double bass). The band's rhythmic cushion is added by two other Finnish band members - Petri Prauda (mandolin, cittern and Estonian bagpipes) and Tuomas Logrén (guitar and dobro - a new sound to Finnish folk music. Its zipping, curling sliding sound weaves among the fiddles so naturally.) MORE fiddling - I say you can never have too much of a good thing - is added by Norweigian brothers Gjermund and Einar Olav Larsen, playing both ordinary and Hardanger fiddle, the Norwegian violin with sympathetic strings.

With their galvanic live shows, and the 2005 second album. Oasis, building on the buzz caused by the 2002 debut album Frigg, the band have been catching ears on both sides of the Atlantic. For example, during the recent US tour an appearance on Garrison Keillor's famous networked radio show

- gives rise to something altogether new. The sound that Frigg delivers can only be described as uplifting. If you've ever listened to Vasen or JPP you'll have an idea, but this band loses all the dark and brooding edges. The music almost always has an undulating quality - a wave-like rise and fall that follows a larger plan of giant swells and sudden calms. The melodies soar while the rhythm skips and grooves along. If you saw them at the Rogue or the Mission Folk Festival last year, you'll know that dancing is pretty much inevitable.

Maybe one of the comments on their website guestbook says it best, ... "I have both your CDs, and I listen to them daily. Your music makes me feel like I could fly. I've never heard anything as beautiful in my entire life."

# **Outlaw Social**

St. James Hall (3214 West 10th Avenue) Tickets \$18 (\$15 members)

utlaw Social is a five piece stringband from Victoria. "Energetic and incredibly accomplished musicians", their sound is unusually crafted by the combination of three lead vocalists, traditional string band instruments with electric guitar, and internationally known musicians. With the release of their debut CD, a seven song e.p., they've gained airplay and top twenty charting status on Canadian national community and campus radio charts, in additional to high praise from critics, promoters, audiences and peer musicians. This fine band brings innovative songwriting and exceptional singing and playing to every performance. Their repertoire includes beautifully constructed original songs set alongside traditional material reinterpreted in a modern folk style.

Adam Dobres (acoustic and electric guitars) had an eclectic musical upbringing. His grandfather was a



master violinist, his father managed bands in England, and Adam started out playing jazz, before moving on to all forms of roots music. He's played with Daniel Lapp at Celtic Connections in Scotland, and toured with Ridley Bent. Catherine Black (banjo, bass, vocals) is a multi-instrumentalist who has played all kinds of venues from cathedrals to seedy bars. Oliver Swain (banjo, bass, vocals) hails from Winnipeg,

where he was a member of The Duhks' predecessors, Scrui MacDuhk. He moved to Victoria and helped found The Bills. Kendel Carson (fiddle) is also a member of The Paperboys and is one of Canada's finest young fiddlers. Pharis Patenaude (guitar, vocals) writes many of the band's songs. She has sung everything from opera to country music. The band members first met years ago at kitchen jams and gigs with other musical partners, but late one night in the fall of 2004, Catherine and Pharis cornered Oliver in a bar - a week later, they had their first show in Victoria. As a trio, they whet their sound in Victoria bars, concerts, and theatres until late summer 2005, when Adam's amazingly tasty electric and acoustic guitars joined in; Kendel, a vibrantly "hell-raising fiddler," graced the group with her steel trap bow shortly after that.

The band made their Rogue debut last year, sharing the bill with Dyad. They stole the show, for me. Such powerful songs and voices, and exemplary musicianship. We are delighted to present the Vancouver Launch of their first full-length CD.

hey say you can tell a man by the links on his website (well they do now). Les Barker's are folk, trains, meals away from motorway services and peace: the quintessential fodder of any self-respecting Northern English working class hero in an anorak (check the Oxford not the Webster's for that one).

It's a good dozen years or more since I first stumbled across Les Barker delightfully bemusing an audience in a beery cloister of Manchester University. I can still vividly picture him reciting his Occasional Table, or how Jason and the Arguments sailed 'by the light of the Morecambe Bay prawns' - a gag not lost on anyone living downwind of the aforementioned bay's dubious nuclear reactor. I was at the venue to see a full-on folk band, but this single unaccompanied, bashful and rather odd spoken worder stole the show.

While his stage persona is half Mancunian (or is that Welsh?) wit and half village idiot, his deft wordplay and beguiling delivery show again and again that he is absolutely nobody's fool. Indeed his disarming but deceptive simplicity is frequently described as comic genius. There is, though, as much

serious political and social commentary as there is comedy, and his delivery throughout mingles the hilarious with the poignant.

And then there is the music. He has kidnapped many a familiar melody and transformed it with his irresistible punning, or just simply improves on the words he replaces. Indeed, folk luminaries such as June Tabor, Dave Swarbrick and Martin Carthy have appeared on his recordings, placing him firmly within the British folk scene. It is this mix of music, spoken word, comedy and social commentary that makes his act so at home on the folk circuit and his unique but simple perspective so widely welcomed. In his words, 'I want freedom. I want equality. And I want honesty. Here, and in all the faraway places. Thus far, the ballot paper has offered none of these things. When it does, perhaps we will have peace. Here, and in all the faraway places'.



# Roque Albums of the Month

Vieux Farka Toure (World Village) Singer/guitarist Ali Farka Toure was for years one of the best known and most respected musicians in Mali, and indeed West Africa, and steadily built a large following in Europe and in North America as well. Ali passed on to the great session in the sky last year, but the Toure torch has been picked up by his son. Vieux Farka Toure.

This is music that reveals some of the ancient roots of the blues, and although Vieux is a young and progressive musician, he doesn't stray too far from his traditional base. Ali had recorded lead guitar for several of the tracks here, and that gritty Niafunke feel is palpable throughout the disc. Another master, Toumani Diabate, plays kora on two gorgeous duets, and their 9 minute closing number in particular is pure Malian magic. Other backing musicians help keep the music grounded as well, especially n'goni player Bassekou Kouvate who knows a riff or two. Vieux's voice hasn't quite the gravitas of his dad's, but still he's an engaging singer. He's also excellent on guitars and calabash.

For some lively and creative roots based music this album is hard to match. Colourful, expressive, and resonant grooves make it a great listen, and a testament to the strong heart and sensitive hands of the Farka Toure lineage. Vieux has a social conscience too, and donates ten percent of the proceeds from this album's sales goes to a UNICEF organization leading the fight against malaria. That generosity of spirit pervades his music too.

Inné Amárach -- Téada (Compass Records) Téada (Tay-da) are a group of sharp young musicians who play a lot of older Irish tunes with the touch of the masters and the vibrancy of the contemporary generation. Their repertoire is deep, their selections immaculate, their touch sublime. This release comprises two discs, the one a CD with a raft of great sets, medleys of grand clusters of tunes, a great coming together of five young musicians who blend and break out wonderfully. The second disc is a DVD short, but shows the band playing, features some interview clips from the various members, and also shines the spotlight on people like Paddy Ryan, recorded chatting and playing, and who, along with expatriate fiddling sensation Michael Coleman, helped set the temper of the Sligo scene that influenced so many players. like the members of Téada. Their blend of fiddle, flute, accordion, guitar and bodhrán is earthy, solid, and yet electric with liveliness and immediacy when they pump out some tunes down the pub. These young hotshots know some very old tunes, and play them with respect and lots of edge.

All tunes, there are no songs here, but a driving, engaging group of musicians creating a wonderful atmosphere with their inspired playing. Tune into this album if you love the Irish music, and hope that Steve brings them in one night. Live they would be a blast.
